Classroom Transformations: Setting the Scene for Successful Learning

This year we launched our new Capital Campaign, "Classroom Transformations: Setting the Scene for Successful Learning." This effort has a focus on improving our physical space to provide the most successful environment for our students. We brought back our visionary partners, Michael Schmitt and Ann Doyle from Michael Schmitt Architect, who designed our beautiful library as well as our innovative Science and Art Center. Schmitt and his team will continue to work hand-in-hand with our leadership team to create a plan for substantial improvements—ones that will maximize space and light, as well as utilize cutting-edge tools and technology.





We are imagining the possibilities that can transform our classrooms and reshape the learning atmosphere. We will examine expanding all of our classrooms and increasing our breakout rooms so we can focus on creating individualized educational curriculum for each student.

Our plans not only include incorporating natural light and brightening our classrooms through creative design, but will reshape the structure each classroom. Significant advancements are in the works and we look forward to the development of these transformations.



Weaving literature into our day-to-day

Our students love to spend time in our newly redesigned library space. And our teachers love it too because it gives them the opportunity to recommend books that our children may not know, broadening their tastes and expanding their minds and vocabularies. This year, we also wanted to bring the magic of literature outside of the library and into the classrooms. So we did—incorporating fictional characters, far away places, and exciting plots into reading, as well as writing.



One of our favorite literature-loving highlights is "I Love to Read Day." During this full-day celebration, each class has a special staff member read aloud to them inside the library, and older classes visit the ground floor to read to the younger classes. Our wonderful PA also hosts a book fair, which gives students the opportunity to peruse and purchase new books of their very own.



An evolved approach to science and art

Our science program has evolved physically, as well as academically. From a physical standpoint, our newly redesigned Science and Art Center grants our students an ideal space to create, imagine, experiment, discover and grow. The aesthetic is driven by natural resources, such as wood, organic tile, cork walls and robust stainless steel. The room also boasts a new storage system that not only holds all of our science equipment (including new science kits for all grades!), but serves as a display area for our students' work.





Our science curriculum has also evolved to mirror our innovative new space, and we've enhanced our already inquiry-based science curriculum to create an even more interactive and collaborative learning experience. Within this evolved curriculum students will implement lots of new science and engineering practices, such as asking questions and defining problems, developing and using models, planning and carrying out investigations, and analyzing and interpreting data. Students will also be constructing explanations and designing solutions, as well as obtaining, evaluating and communicating information.

For our older classes, we've expanded our neuroscience curriculum with a variety of hands-on experiments and multisensory activities relating to the brain and nervous system. These activities keep our students' brains engaged, and include dissecting a cauliflower and comparing it to a brain and understanding how the brain perceives beauty in art and music.

And science is just the start. This space also allows students to create and explore different and more complex mediums of art related to science. With lots of open space and large working areas, students are participating in larger-scale projects that make use of more interesting materials and experiment with 3-deminsional art.



Artists inspired by cultures near and far—new and old.

ART SHOW

Just like West End Day is "more than a school," this year's art show was, indeed, "more than an art show." A collaboration of inspirational art and writing, it was entitled "The Art of Inspiration: An Exploration of Global influences," and each class drew inspiration from a specific culture and used the art from that culture to inspire their work.

Our youngest class drew their inspiration locally from their surrounding city. The students created mixed media collage portraits of well-known New Yorkers and wrote an autobiography about past and present influential people from New York City.

Our other classes found their inspiration from around the globe. The younger

classes drew inspiration from the ancient Egyptian and Mayan cultures, designing their own pharaohs and Mayan influenced Stelae sculptures out of clay. The students wrote letters from the point of view of the famous pharaohs from Ancient Egypt and poetry in the shape of a pyramid about various aspects of Mayan culture.



Our older classes drew their inspiration from Europe and Asia. After researching European Explorers, students chose an explorer to focus on and created life-sized portraits of them based on their learned. Students also wrote letters in the voice of the explorer, writing to family members back home to tell them all about their discoveries.





In our study of Asian countries, our students learned about various cultures and influential people within each. They were inspired to design and create their own mixed media vases based on the examples studied from the Ming Dynasty of China and wrote about inspirational people they had learned about.

WINTER SING

WEDS continued the theme of inspiration in this year's Winter Sing entitled "Music that Inspires Change." Each class chose a song that not only inspired them personally, but at one point in time, inspired change around the world. "Three Little Birds" by Bob Marley was sung by our youngest students and represented Bob Marley's lifetime of work appealing for justice, peace and equal rights. "Imagine," by John Lennon, was another class choice because its message asks people to imagine a world at peace and without division.



Our older classes sang "One" by U2, a song all about unity and the importance of human rights and social justice. The WEDS chorus sang their own rendition of Michal Jackson's "Man in the Mirror," a song that sends the message that change begins with all of us. The event was a memorable one, and it closed with the entire school coming together to sing "We are the World," a song that raised over \$63 million for humanitarian aid in Africa and the U.S. more than two decades ago. The Winter Sing stage was decorated by our students as well, and its design highlighted the featured songs as well as the theme of coming together to make positive change.
